"Informal Practical Reasoning" (Several essays designed to become chapters of a textbook on practical reasoning.) Presented to several meetings of the Nashua circle, 2002. (Nashua Circle: a group of local philosophers who informally meet periodically to present and critique work-in-progress)

"Some distinctions in the Study of Rationality" (An analysis of several distinctions widely used in the study of reasoning that overlap and cut

across both critical rationality and practical rationality, and an attempt ascertain points of agreement, conflict, and incompatibility.) 26 pages. Presented to the Nashua Circle, January, 2001.

"Abductive Reasoning" (A case analysis and summary of steps of abduction.) 3 pages. Presented to the Nashua circle in connection with interdisciplinary curriculum development, philosophy and science. March, 2003.

"Evolutionary accounts of distributive Justice" (A review of recent work on evolutionary accounts of ethical values, and a comparison of evolutionary accounts with rational choice accounts of these same ideal, taking distributive justice as a test case.) 13 pages. Presented to the Nashua Circle, January, 2000.

Review of <u>The Last Word by Thomas Nagel</u> (OUP.1997). (A general overview of the philosophical challenges this book addresses, a summary of the author's aims, and an analysis of some of the specific arguments with special relevance to the problem of practical reason.) 6 pages. Presented to the Nashua Circle, January, 1998.

"Ethics and Ethnic Diversity" (Explores, for the purposes of a grant, problems and solutions surrounding the tension between a person's commitment to his or her moral principles and encouraging ethnic and cultural diversity in others.) Manuscript of 10 pages. Presented to the Nashua circle.

"Self-Esteem as Moral Self-Assessment" (Explores the conditions and criteria of the moral self-evaluation that would result in a certain kind of self-esteem or its opposite.) Manuscript in initial stage.

"Needs and Wants" (Examines the claim that there is a greater moral obligation to meet a need than there is to satisfy a competing want for the same object.) Manuscript of 17 pages. Presented to the Nashua Circle.

"Decision Theory and Rational Choice" (Three part presentation to the Mathematics, Political Science, and Psychology faculties, respectively, of research and curriculum development resulting from one of my Sabbatical projects. Mathematics: Multi-criteria analysis and aggregation, preference theory, risk analysis and representation, and game theory. Political Science: Bargaining and negotiations within the frame work of decision theory. Psychology: Major psychological factors in bad decision making.) 13 pages. "and/or" (Examines the construct "and/or" in order to discover its similarities with and differences from the logical constants expressing propositional conjunction and disjunction.) Manuscript of 23 pages. Presented to the Nashua Circle.

"The Theory of Just War: A Case of Applied Ethics" (Examines the criteria and conditions in terms of which a war can be judged to be just or unjust and applies these to the Gulf War). Manuscript of 8 pages. Presented as a workshop/discussion group at Rivier College's Gulf War Teach-In, February, 1991.

"Supervenience and the Foundation Relation" (Research project for NEH Grant 1990. Explores Husserl's anti-reductionist and anti-realist conception of mental content, the relation between mental content and mental event, comparisons with conceptions of the relation of supervenience.)
