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## Rivier College President's Circle brings business leaders together to discuss best practices in responding to workplace violence

Imagine your CEO's cell phone interrupting your senior staff meeting. The caller says that an employee with a device that looks like a bomb has just entered the building. How do you respond?

In April 2008, participants in Rivier College's third President's Circle event discussed how they would handle the situation. The program completed the first year of the President's Circle with a focus on emergency preparedness. Gerard Group International presented a workplace violence scenario using audio and video presentations to provide details and new developments. Table groups updated their plans of action based on the new information; Gerard Group's Ilana Freedman, CEO, and Scott Winchell, Senior Vice

President, led a discussion on responses and their potential outcomes.

Rich Moore, Vice President & Chief Operating Officer of UPS, Northern New England District said he believes attendees of the seminar came to a quick realization that they had work to do to prepare for different possibilities. "I will be conducting similar exercises with my staff in the future to ensure we have a solid plan," he says.

More than 80 people attended, including Nashua Mayor Donnalee Lozeau and executives from UPS, BAE Systems, Morgan Stanley, the City of Nashua, the Division of Public Health, and The Telegraph. Representatives from area banks, law offices, and large and small businesses attended as well.
