

"The thirteen women wanted to celebrate their first in the nation female majority senate with a book signing," Della Fera said. The book signing, the first for the 13 women, was, Della Fera says, "a fitting way to bring all the women together to bring closure to their majority status and to wish all success in their new endeavors and challenges."

Aeronautical Sciences in Nice, France. Both papers were published in the conference proceedings.

Assistant Vice President for Student Development **Paula Randazza** received the Student Leadership Training Program's Fall 2010 Champions of Youth Award. The award recognizes people who work with students to develop their leadership skills.



Associate Professor of Art **Sheli Petersen** attended the 2010 Summer Conference for the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators in Los Angeles. She presented her work in the Portfolio Showcase and participated in the Picture Book workshop. Her drawings, *The Printmakers and The Judge*, were published in the July/ August issue of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators Bulletin. She also displayed her drawing, *Barred Owls and Fox*, in the Maine Illustrators Collective December Exhibition at the Freeport Community Library. The illustration is part of her series exploring the relation-ship of New England wildlife

to the landscape. As in most of her illustration, Petersen combined life-drawing, observation, and references to imagine and create this scene, done with watercolor and prisma color on paper.

Associate Professor of Business Administration **Dr. Gregory Kivenzor** has been named Chair of the Special Session at the 2011 World Marketing Congress.
