

The exhibition at Rivier University features "photographs of people who are fugitives in their worlds, who have little or no voice or are unaware of their contributions," says Jones. Included are images from the Olympic games and street photos from various other world settings. "For over twenty years I've been shooting the Olympics. It's the biggest cross-cultural, international event in the world. Every four years a host country builds a whole new city. . . another city within a city. Whereas some people specialize in landscapes, architecture, animals, flowers or still life, mostly I photograph people," added Jones. "And the best place to find large concentrations is cities—big cities—metropolis."

"As photographer Lou Jones might be identified as a proud citizen of the world, one who with great affection and visual acuity detects the deeper relationships between environments and their impact on the human experience," said Sr. Theresa Couture, Director of the Art Gallery at Rivier University.

The exhibition will be accompanied by a Gallery Talk by the artist on Thursday, Feb. 13 at 4 p.m., with an inclement weather date of Feb. 20.
